

Secret in the Cold War era, open to the public since 2005.
Austria's largest fortification system was turned into a museum.

Neutral since 1955, Austria was situated between the military alliances NATO and Warsaw Pact until the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991. To prevent foreign troops from passing through the country, the Austrian Armed Forces erected barriers, bunkers, and field positions in crucial areas across the country.

Built between 1963 and 1995, the WURZEN/73 Blocking Position remained fully operational until 2002, and was regularly used for exercises of the ready reserve:

- Security operation at the national border (1991/SLO = case of emergency)
- Blockage of the B109 road and defence at the saddle in the case of an attack

Mind you, our visitors do not need any pre-knowledge. Right at the start, we give you a general introduction to our premises. After that, feel free to explore the 11,400 m² on your own: Experience everything yourself! We will be glad to answer your questions and be your guides!

It is not our intention to glorify the use of force, weapons, or the armed forces. On the contrary! Within the borders of today's peacefully united Europe yesterday's bunkers and weapons have, fortunately, become superfluous. However, what will Europe be like tomorrow? The future always remains uncertain. This is why we had better learn from history.

Original bunkers, connecting tunnels and fighting positions

Explore the seven anti-armour/anti-infantry bunkers that were used as command and supply structures as well as shelters for soldiers. They are connected through tunnel-like passageways, including fighting positions (in original condition).

Unique exposition of special heavy weapons systems

Display of all special heavy weapons systems that were part of the stationary weaponry of all Austrian bunkers during the Cold War. Take a look at subsurface cannons, mounted tank turrets, and decoys (camouflage facilities). View anti-infantry and anti-tank barriers, boats, as well as mobile anti-tank, anti-aircraft, and machine guns. Marvel at the grenade launchers and at the wheeled and armoured vehicles used by the Blocking troops.

Action days: "Tank Ride and Goulash from the Field Stove"

Experience the bunker premises while riding in an Infantry Fighting Vehicle. Take in your surroundings and learn that, in operations, hatches remain closed. We heartily invite you to taste our fine "cannon goulash" prepared in a genuine field stove!
